

Expanded Primary Health Care Coming to Durham Region

Interprofessional team-based care supports better access for patients

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The Central East Local Health Integration Network (Central East LHIN) in partnership with the government of Ontario is providing more people with better access to high-quality health care closer to home, by supporting the expansion of the interprofessional team-based care currently being offered by Carea Community Health Centre in Durham Region.

This enhancement of the interprofessional team-based care services at Carea through a new \$500,000 investment will better connect people in the Central East LHIN's Durham sub-regions with a range of health care professionals, such as nurse practitioners, social workers and health educators to address a broad variety of healthcare needs, including mental health and chronic disease management.

Carea, in partnership with the Central East LHIN and its primary care physician leads, will also utilize this new investment to help build a primary health care community of practice of family doctors, nurse-practitioners and other primary health care providers who can collaborate on the design and development of a strong, organized and integrated primary health care system in Durham Region.

QUICK FACTS

- Ontario is creating new and expanded primary care programs and services in order to respond to the health and social service needs of communities across the province, including Franco-Ontarians, newcomers and seniors.
- In the 2017 Budget, the province made a commitment of \$15.5 million for 2017-18 and an additional \$27.8 million in 2018-19 to create and expand interprofessional primary care teams (Family Health Teams, Nurse Practitioner-Led Clinics, Community Health Centres) focusing on areas with the greatest needs.
- Ontario has also committed \$329.2 million over five years to recruit and retain interprofessional primary care professionals.
- There are currently 294 interprofessional care teams across Ontario delivering care to more than four million people.
- The province is providing \$23 million per year over three years to improve care coordination for complex patients through an initiative called Health Links, that wraps a team of health care providers around patients with the most complex conditions so that they can provide co-ordinated, timely health care.
